

own rate system not fair

TUMBY Bay District Council mayor Laurie Collins does not think the current system of applying rates is fair across the board, with ratepayers in the district's residential areas set to pay an average rate rise of 10 per cent this

The high residential rate rise is a stark contrast to the rural rate rise, which is not expected to tip past 2 per cent.

Councillor Bob Lawrie said the residential rate rise of between 10 and 13 per cent would apply to properties valued between \$100,000 and \$140,000, meaning it would affect the majority of the Tumby Bay township.

He said the rate difference between township and rural was unfair to people living in the

residential areas.

Mr Lawrie proposed a fairer rate difference at a council budget meeting last week, but the alternative was dismissed.

"The ones that voted against it were three farmers," he said.
